BECOMING SNOWBJRD





Autumn in the Pacific Northwest provides some of the best weather of the year. The fall season is also the time when many start to think about the dreariness of the many dark and wet days of winter that lie in the future. Thousands of snowbirds begin preparing now for their annual migration from the Northwest (or snowy areas of the upper Midwest and Canada) to the sunnier and warmer climates of Texas, Arizona, and California. Generally, 41 percent of winter visitors to the Sunbelt areas spend eight weeks or more each year away from home and nearly 30 percent at least 12 weeks. One of the advantages of having a motorhome is the ability to change locations - if you don't like the weather, move ... if you don't like the neighbors, go somewhere else.

Last year was our first time to venture south for at least part of the winter season. Perhaps some insights will stimulate your daydreaming or motivate you to start planning. I have also asked some of our veteran travelers to share some of their winter traveling experiences.



Where do we start? – or – What is our first stop? For many Trekkers heading south the first stop is the Quartzite Rally sponsored by the Southwest Trek Fun Club. Treks from all over park in a circle in the desert and enjoy the fellowship. The RV show provides an array of RV products and information. Redlands Truck & RV brings a mobile shop - and sells Michelin tires too. Last year the NWTFC had 15 coaches at the Quartzite rally. The 2016 Quartzite rally dates are January 15 - 18.

"For four years we have joined with the Safari folks at the Indio FMCA rally and then went on to the SW Trek Quartzite rally, and both have been great experiences. There are usually several Palm Springs area campsites that

give out three-day passes at the Indio rally." Bob and Peggy Beers.

Where are we going to go?

Many first time snowbirds spend their first year of freedom visiting several different areas. There are so many places to explore in the southwest part of the U.S. - Palm Springs, Valley of the Sun (Phoenix metro area), Yuma, Lake Havasu, and other out of the way places. Find those places that offer the services and amenities that you enjoy.

Before long though, many snowbirds tend to go back to the same places year after year; often making their reservations at the end of the season for next year. Some even decide to purchase a second home or a place to park their Trek. We have long-term NW Trek members residing in Yuma and Mesa. Other friends of ours spend a couple months in the Desert Hot Springs area of California.

"We spend a great deal of time in Yuma, but consider this a base for other adventures." David and Sue Pierce.

Where are we going to park?

You get to decide where and how long you want to stay in one place. For those with an RV there is everything from plush parks to spartan spaces for desert squatters. You can park in the desert for free for up to two weeks before needing to move. Arizona has some wonderful state parks, and they are popular destinations. We stayed at Catalina, Lost Dutchman, and Karchner Caverns to name a few. Some of these state parks fill up fast, so making a reservation is important.



Some RV parks are very reasonable, but may want you to commit to a week or a month as a minimum. Other parks are quite expensive, but offer entertainment, organized activities, and all the amenities imaginable.

"We hole up in Mesa for several weeks visiting the CalAm parks with our Passport America discounts. Then we head to Tucson and Yuma to visit friends. By early April we head home." Bob and Peggy Beers.



What are we going to do?

What do you like to do while you are at home? That is probably what you will do in the desert.

If you like to be active and engage in sports, then you can find new friends and play golf, tennis, or swim. If you like to explore, they are numerous ghost towns, museums, art galleries, towns, and festivals to discover. When you spread the word that you are going south, you can meet up with more friends than you can imagine – it is amazing how many people go south.

How much is it going to cost?

Your expenses will depend on your preferences. How much does it cost you to live at home? Do you cook or enjoy dining at fine restaurants? Do you have hobbies? Do you like to explore and do tourist things? You can be a snowbird and live on a budget. Your main costs are for food and parking – and those depend on the choices you make.

Where do we start?

If you are thinking about spending part of the winter in the Sunbelt, now is not too early to start planning. Start talking to your friends and fellow Trekkies. Find out where they like to go. Start checking out parks and destinations. If you know parks where you want to stay, advance reservations may be a good idea.

As the fall season winds down, give your motorhome a thorough check-up. Tires, belts, batteries, engine operations – look for all the possible things that can go wrong. And there will always be surprises along the way. Those surprises become tales to tell around the campfire.

Plan to slow down and smell the roses. The trip to and from your sunny destination should be as much fun as the time you spend where you are going. Try going a different route – see what else is out there in this big country of ours.
