
FMCA DUES ANNOUNCEMENT

the grass is greener and the leftovers are enticing. We have shared the campground with elk at Yellowstone and at the Grand Canyon.


Some of these animals are smaller, but cuter. Who has not stopped to watch the antics of a chipmunk or a prairie dog?

NEW – YOUNGER – TREK OWNERS BRING NEW DIRECTIONS

At the 2021 Quartzsite Rally there some new, younger Trek owners that had remodeled their Treks to better suit their needs. These folks work from their Trek, so some of the changes were to enable them to be more productive in their businesses. Some of the changes involved the electronics, batteries, and furniture. One of the changes was shocking – they painted the beautiful, solid wood cabinets white! Here is a description of some of the changes they made to their Trek.

We acquired our 2002 model 2830 Trek in January of 2020. We had been looking for a Trek motorhome for months, and based on a tip from a neighbor, we were able to find one in our little town of Polson,



Montana. It was in good shape and mechanically sound. The original owner had done pretty much all the engine and chassis upgrades that were available.

Our desire was to set up our motorhome up for 2 people to live in full-time. We needed to be able to work from the road, and we wanted to have the ability to boondock for extended periods of time.

We started by redoing the inside. We painted all the walls and cabinets and put new fabric on the valances. We took out the desk, sofa and dining areas and put in a standing desk, build a custom day bed/couch with storage for the lithium battery underneath. We had a table built that can be set up or

taken down and stored underneath the couch when not needed. We removed the tv cabinet. We put in new flooring and changed the lights to LED.

Some of the not so visible things that we did are the electrical upgrades. Darrel installed a new inverter, built the space for a lithium battery, installed 800 watts of solar on the roof and put in a solar charge controller. He also added quite a bit of communications equipment so he could work from the road. He installed a roof-top cellular antenna, a mobile router, as well as a cell booster with an exterior antenna.

Another fun feature we added was changing out the sewer hose holder and installing a vinyl fence post behind the door. In that compartment we are able to store our collapsible 7-foot step ladder hidden out of view. When the door says "sewer hose" no one bothers it!

We set up our Jeep Cherokee so it could be flat-towed. We enjoy having a towed vehicle because it makes trips to the grocery store or around town very convenient. We also enjoy leaving the motorhome for a few days at a time to head out with our tent and go for an overland adventure.



We have lived in our motorhome for over 8 months now and we feel it has met our needs very well. We



have used it in a variety of circumstances from RV parks, to rallies, to extended stays boondocking on BLM land. We have found that the solar has been adequate and the communication equipment has made it easy to work from the road.
