FMCA Receives Research Report on Prospective Members

Marketing General Inc., a major data research firm, did a study of the perspectives of RV owners who are not members of FMCA. In other words – what are the needs and wants of the general RV world that has not rushed to join FMCA? The study had four objectives:

- Determining perceptions of FMCA and its brand.
- Understanding what prospective members would want from a membership in FMCA.
- 3. Identifying preferences of prospective members regarding communication and association.
- 4. Determining attitudes toward FMCA's governing structure, chapter membership, and voting rights.

A survey was conducted among RV owners identified through a purchased list. The significance of this study was that the results were data-driven (not opinions), independent, and relevant. Here are some study findings.

70% of RV owners typically travel less than 300 miles in year with their RV.

Half of participants use their RV for 30 days a year or less.

The **FMCA emblem** (goose egg with the 1953 bus) is outdated and doesn't reflect their type of RVing. The name **Family Motor Coach Association** suggests the association only welcomes or caters to motor home owners.

Participants were asked to rank 37 potential benefits that would entice them to join an RV association. Top 10 benefits were:

- 1. Campground discounts
- 2. Fuel discounts
- 3. Campground finder/reservation system
- 4. Roadside assistance plan in dues
- 5. Discounts on parts or service
- 6. Campground reviews
- 7. Mobile app for trip planning:
- 8. Free dump stations
- 9. Rapid response when help needed
- 10. Unlimited mobile hot spot WIFI plans

Bottom 10 benefits – not of primary interest

- 37. Ability to influence association
- 37. Affinity groups (chapters) based on interests
- 35. Association sponsored service projects
- 34. Chapters based on regional areas that have rallies
- 33. Advocacy on behalf of Rvers
- 32. Regional or national rallies (conventions) with workshops/vendors
- 31. Medical insurance program for full-time RVers
- 30. Ombudsman to help resolve problems with manufacturers
- 29. Means to connect with RV owners for gatherings
- 28. Medical evacuation program (FMCAssist)

Key conclusions from the study:

- Most RVers own towables FMCA must emphasize towables over motor homes.
- Most RVers do not travel far from home and do not use their RV more than 30 days a year.
- 3. FMCA emblem does not relate to typical RV owners.
- 4. FMCA name and reference to "motor coach" is a hindrance to growth.
- 5. Discounts and roadside assistance are key benefits desired.
- 6. RV chapters and medical evacuation program are not incentives to stimulate membership growth.
- 7. Hanging out with friends and meeting new people is what RVing is all about.

A similar report from **Membership Corporation of America** (MCA) provided recommendation to move FMCA forward. Some insights from their report:

- Current branding presentation does not align with prospects expectations of what an RV association should look like.
- Options should be explored regarding governance to include the 84% of members who are not in chapters.
- There is a misalignment of current member benefits to what prospects are looking for in an association.
- Social media represents the #1 way FMCA can create awareness in the broader RV community.



788 registered RVs gathered in Gillette, WY for the 107th FMCA Convention. 228 of these were first-time attendees. As always, there were many helpful workshops to help RVers enjoy their rigs more.

The Governing Board (GB) met on

Wednesday, and this meeting turned out to be long one – it lasted from 9:00 am to 6:20 pm.

The research report by MGI (see page 3) was one of the first presentations. This was followed by the adoption of Planning for FMCA's Future (strategic plan) proposed by the Long Range Planning Committee. This is the first strategic plan to be implemented since 2003.

Several constitution and bylaw changes (some related to the strategic plan) were adopted: Constitution changes will need to be brought before the entire membership.

- FMCA may choose to operate under an assumed business name and a process was identified for approving a dba.
- A new mission and purpose statement were adopted.
- A new "Pathfinder" category of membership was created and defined as someone who has not purchased an RV, but is in a research phase and planning to buy an RV.

As always there were several policies and procedures that were brought before the body.

- The emblem (goose egg) will remain.
- A process for adopting a logo for marketing purposes was identified.
 Approval of a new logo rests with the Executive Board.

- Wednesday night featured dueling pianos and a request sing-a-long.


